CALL TO ORDER: at 7:35 a.m. by Dr. Nytech.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: Motion to approve June 2026 meeting minutes made by Ms. Leary, seconded by Mr. Simmons. All were in favor of approving the minutes, none opposed, motion approved.

PRESENTATION: Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) overview presented by Ms. Squair. PHEP supports coordinated emergency preparedness across government levels, with public health staff contributing through illness prevention, disease investigation, education, and regular training. The PHEP team maintains plans, conducts exercises, and collaborates with Tioga County Community Organizations Active in Disaster (COAD), Tioga County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC), and other partners, using after-action findings to strengthen readiness. Local emergencies such as rabies incidents, COVID-19, and an H5 case highlight the need for preparedness across all declaration levels. The Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) continues to support local response efforts. Tioga County is advancing through the Project Public Health Ready accreditation process, focusing on mass care, pandemic readiness, and extreme weather. Coordination with Emergency Services is improving, Incident Command System principles are being integrated, and communication gaps are being addressed through infrastructure upgrades and backup systems. Continued collaboration with community organizations remains strong, though dispatch challenges and concerns regarding the Sheriff's limited use of the new dispatch center were noted.

Board members thanked Ms. Squair for presenting and complimented her commitment to her role.

Ms. Squair departed meeting at 8:12 a.m.

OLD BUSINESS:

- Legislator Standinger noted that those experiencing homelessness are intermittently returning to the previous encampment property in the Village of the Owego. Village police are monitoring the area. Board members briefly discussed.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT: Ms. Vroman distributed and shared her Director's Report.

Public Health Information:

- Federal funding: remains stable and has some increases in core program areas. New York State is expected to receive about \$212 million from the Rural Health Transformation funding (part of

the Big Beautiful Bill). Each county is eligible for up to \$500,000, but local health departments are unable to apply directly (must be CBO or hospital to be eligible to apply). UHS filed two implementation projects via Care Compass Network (CCN) with county support: Paramedicine expansion program to Broome, Tioga and Delaware Counties and Maternal and child health services. There are concerns about CCN's limited local presence and budget allocations.

- Cyclospora Outbreak: A multi-state outbreak (31) with over 4,000 cases likely linked to produce. There are no cases in Tioga County currently. Public guidance is to recognize symptoms and seek evaluation. Noted that washing produce may not remove the parasite. Board members discussed alternative cleansing methods.
- Ebola update: Nearly 1,400 cases, with 438 deaths reported globally, with no confirmed cases in the U.S. Traveler monitoring is ongoing.
- Tick-borne Illnesses: There are roughly 239 tick-borne cases in Tioga County, with anaplasmosis at 45 cases. There have been 20 hospitalizations year-to-date, with hospital stays ranging from 2-10 days. Statewide increases are noted for anaplasmosis, Lyme and Powassan virus.

Staffing:

- An offer for the Office Specialist II was accepted, with a start date of August 10.

Accomplished Activities:

- The Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) was submitted to the state, focusing on housing stability, social context, and healthcare access. A full presentation is planned for the September Board of Health meeting. (handout distributed on priority areas)
- In collaboration with Tioga County Mental Hygiene, we submitted and were awarded a grant by NYS Office of Mental Health Suicide Prevention Center of New York for Building Capacity for Rural Suicide Prevention in NYS for \$132,000.
- Public Health Nurse presented RPEP guidelines at UHS to emergency department physicians.
- Conducted drive through rabies clinic at Hickories Park in June and vaccinated 169 pets. There was high public satisfaction, and we are considering the drive-through model for future events.

In-Progress Tasks:

- Ms. Medina is currently at the NACCHO Annual Conference in Kentucky and Ms. Holochak and Ms. Russell are at the CADCA Mid-Year Conference in Orlando. We have a travel expectation policy requiring they present what they learned and will forward their informational material to Board members when complete.
- The department is developing a new strategic plan following county guidelines and National Public Health accreditation standards. Board of Health feedback survey results are being analyzed. Next surveys include Public Health Competency and Training Needs for Public Health staff.
- The 2027 Budget is being finalized and will be presented in August, with a positive financial forecast.
- Staff will be tabling at summer events to provide education and outreach, including Sundaes at the Farm, Newark Valley SummerFest, Tioga County Fair and Back to School Party.

Board Action Items:

- Ms. Vroman asked members to review the information in their member binders. Plan for next meeting to discuss what members would like to see next year, any initiatives, information to be provided, or if anything needs updating.

Other:

- Break in August. Next meeting will be in September, and we will have a presentation on the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP).

NEW BUSINESS:

- Enforcements: briefly noted, no discussion.
- Ms. Vroman stated that she will be on vacation starting Friday and through next week.

AGENCY REPORT

June 25-July 22, 2026

Highlights

- We received Notice of Award for the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration STOP ACT underage drinking prevention grant.
- We submitted a presentation abstract for the 2026 Statewide Harm Reduction Symposium on the Tioga County ASAP Coalition, and it has been accepted!
- We trialed our first fully drive-through Rabies Clinic at Hickories Park. It was a success, vaccinating 169 pets, and we received lots of positive community feedback!
- We kept the community informed with messaging on extreme heat and air quality and safety measures while smoke covered the southern tier from the Canadian fires.
- Public Health Director worked with UHS Hospitals and Care Compass Network in the development of their Rural Health Transformation grant proposal for Tioga County.
- Congratulations to Kristin Russell for being recognized as Team Member of the Second Quarter!

Health Education

- Tioga County ASAP sponsored two free summer movies at the Tioga Theater, this included Toy Story 5 and Minions and Monsters! Both movies had great attendance. Health Educators tabled and distributed educational material to families.
- Public Health Educator/ASAP Coalition Coordinator delivered kits to Owego restaurants and bars, which included information on alcohol responsible server training and fraud detector penlights for identifying fake IDs.
- Health Educators did several bicycle helmet education and fitting sessions through the Helmet First, Ride Second Program, including the summer programs at Camp Ahwaga, Newark Valley, and Candor.
- Health Educator participated in Family Resource Center story times at Nichols, Waverly, and Spencer, discussing playground safety tips for kids.
- Lactation Counselor/ Health Educator continues to do regular check-ins with clients daily or as questions arise, mostly over text message or phone calls. However, we have had several in-person appointments as well. Lactation Education now has a baby scale for in person mothers to weigh their babies.

Environmental Health

- Director of Environmental Health and Director of Weights and Measures checked on the new construction of the new Richford Fire Station, as the station will be permitted to have water and food.
- Director of Environmental Health attended the Tioga County Water Quality Meeting and shared information on our Healthy Homes program, water testing and rabies statistics.

- Investigations for animal bites/exposures have been very active, especially related to bats.

Patient Services (EI, Dental, Clinic)

- Communicable Disease team has been working on an increased number of investigations for gastrointestinal illnesses and tickborne illnesses (especially anaplasmosis).
- Public Health Nurse presented to the UHS Emergency Department physicians and mid-level providers on rabies post-exposure prophylaxis (RPEP).
- We are trialing Speech-Therapy services via tele-health within Early Intervention. So far, this has been a positive experience, and we are hopeful that we can have more parents and providers interested in doing this.
- Early Intervention Program continues to receive a steady number of referrals. As intakes and caseloads increase in number, our children waiting for services increases also. The provider shortage is especially noticeable for children needing Physical Therapy and Speech Therapy.
- The Dental Van has been very busy this summer with lots of new patients. We continue to struggle with finding specialty referrals for patients with Medicaid.

Administration

- PHEP Coordinator presented to the Board of Health on Emergency Preparedness.
- Continue with Quality Improvement projects, Preschool Program-Transportation, Food Safety Course, Rabies Post-Exposure Fiscal Processes, and Communicable Disease Investigation Training, including a new project that will review our client-patient feedback process.
- Completed the annual review of the Tioga County Public Health Administrative Policy Manual. The process included an initial review by the Management Team and the Public Health Director, followed by a five-day review period for all Public Health staff.
- New Consent for Disclosure of Health information forms were created and approved for use in the lead, clinic and dental programs.

Workforce Development

- Deputy Director attended the National Association of City and County Health Officials (NACCHO) annual conference in Kentucky and brought back a lot of insights from local health departments across the country.
- Public Health Project Coordinator and Public Health Educator attended the community Anti-Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA) Mid-Year and Fentanyl Free America Conference in Orlando.
- Our medical licensed staff completed required training in Basic Life Support CPR certification- offered in-house by our Public Health Nurse who is a certified instructor.
- Health Educator attended the Pryor Learning Managing Multiple Priorities training.
- Health Educator completed Youth Mental Health First Aid Training and post-work (which is a pre-requisite for becoming a trainer).

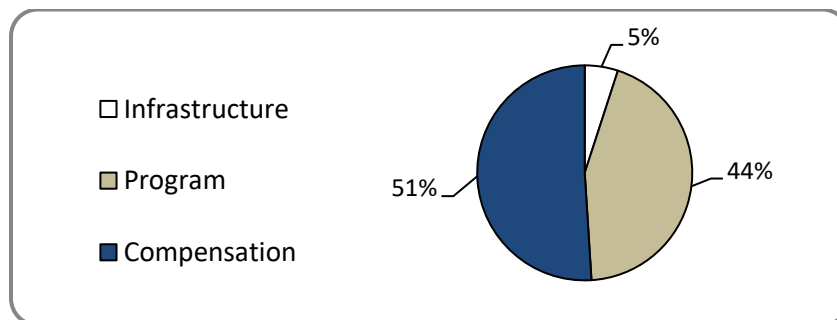

AGENCY REPORT

July 23-August 26, 2026

Highlights

- Our entire team responded to measles concerns in the community, and one confirmed case. We held an impromptu vaccination clinic for unvaccinated community members and completed several home visits. In total, we vaccinated 43 adults and children, helping protect vulnerable residents and prevent further spread.
- On the Early Intervention Annual Performance Report issued by NYSDOH, our program achieved 100% compliance for timely IFSP completion and timely transition discussions—an outstanding reflection of our team's commitment to families.
- The TCPH team assisted with various aspects of the Tioga County Fair. EH staff ensured all mobile food units maintained good hygiene- completing pre-operational inspections and onsite inspections. Other team members tabled for TCPH and Medical Reserve Corp (MRC) during the fair; promoting various programs.
- We officially launched the new Weights and Measures tab on the website, giving community members direct access to program information and a convenient way to submit consumer complaints.
- We revamped our Public Health reception area, creating a more welcoming and functional space for visitors.
- We welcomed Jody Inderwies, our new Office Specialist II!

- We had an exceptional month for Naloxone distribution, providing 502 boxes countywide. This included 250 boxes to Racker, 216 to Tioga Downs Casino, 24 to Stray Haven, and 12 to Candor High School. Tioga Downs also installed 16 Public Access Naloxone (PAN) Boxes, greatly expanding emergency access.
- The Public Health Project Coordinator completed several media interviews, including Cayuga Radio Group on the importance of checking naloxone expiration dates and WBNG on measles prevention and staying up to date with MMR vaccines.
- The Health Ed Team met with multiple Tioga County school districts to plan collaborations for the upcoming school year. Topics included initiatives through Tioga ASAP, the Tioga County Suicide Prevention Coalition, Tioga Smiles Dental Program, traffic safety, immunizations, and the school exclusion process.
- Health Educators continued their summer helmet distribution efforts at Newark Valley and Candor programs. Over 225 helmets have already been given out, with two more events scheduled for September.

- Staff met with the Prevention Coalition of Broome County to share current initiatives implemented through the Tioga County ASAP Coalition.
- Tioga ASAP sponsored additional family movie days at the Tioga Theater, with the most recent showing of *Paw Patrol* attracting more than 110 attendees. The coalition also distributed over 30 packs of Tioga County Fair tickets. To qualify, participants completed a parent survey designed to fill gaps in existing data—resulting in more than 400 completed responses.
- Health Education staff attended the Catholic Charities backpack giveaway event at Tioga Central Schools, providing outreach and resources.
- Our Public Health Educator/Lactation Consultant attended Tioga Opportunities Inc. WIC Program’s Breastfeeding Tea Party, offering support and information to families.
- Public Health Educator continues to do outreach at Family Resource Centers throughout the county. This month, they read kids books about making your plate a rainbow and the Hungry Caterpillar eating up a garden.

Environmental Health

- The Director of Environmental Health and the Public Health Sanitarian certified a new 1A and 1B water operator for Veolia, supporting safe and consistent water system operations.
- Our Lead Program has been busy, completing three environmental assessments this month. Two of the three homes were found to have no lead hazards, offering reassurance to the families involved.
- We partnered with the Parks and Recreation Departments in Owego and Waverly to develop new signage for local parks, providing clear information on what to do in the event of an animal bite.

Patient Services (EI, Dental, Clinic)

- We received confirmation of our successful completion of the Year 14 Article 6 Incentive Program, which focused on the promotion of oral health in primary care settings.
- The dental van and team participated in Newark Valley SummerFest for community outreach.
- New “No Cavity Club” certificates were created to boost engagement with pediatric dental patients. Children who have no cavities receive a certificate, and their first names are added to the recognition wall in the dental van.
- The Director of Dental Health Services continues efforts to find Medicaid dental referral sources, contacting providers from Albany to Rochester with no available options found so far.
- A new social media and radio campaign for the School-Based Dental Program was created using grant funds, scheduled to air on WEBO and Choice 102 in September and October.
- A CPSE provider has resumed accepting Early Intervention cases, and an EI provider from Broome County has agreed to serve a child who transferred into Tioga. Along with several existing providers taking on many previously waitlisted children, these changes have significantly reduced the Early Intervention waitlist.

- Nursing has had a high-volume month, managing follow-up for individuals receiving rabies post-exposure treatment, as well as monitoring tickborne and gastrointestinal illnesses.
- Public Health Nurse completed annual N95 mask fit testing for all staff.
- We have already begun administering vaccines for school age children in our clinic in preparation for the new school year.

Administration

- The 2027–2029 Tioga County Public Health Strategic Plan continues to progress. Five surveys were completed across the TCPH team, the Tioga County Legislature, the Board of Health, and community partners/stakeholders. The Strategic Plan Implementation Team has reviewed all survey results and compiled key findings to guide the next phase of planning.
- The in-state review of Project Public Health Ready (accreditation for Public Health Emergency Preparedness) was completed, and the final application—incorporating all suggested edits—has been officially submitted to the National Review Team.
- Mackenzie Squair, Public Health Emergency Preparedness Coordinator, is now serving as chair of the Tioga County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC).
- Public Health Director participated in the Debris Management Plan update meeting.
- We completed the second quarter record audit review for 2026 with our Medical Consultant, Dr. Zevan.
- Submitted the Second Quarter State Aid Voucher for Article 6 funding and reimbursement. It was a large amount totaling \$374,838.
- All Management/ Confidential evaluations were completed and submitted to Tioga County Personnel and Civil Service.

Workforce Development

- Public Health Nurse completed Basic Life Support training with our licensed staff.
- Public Health Educator became certified in Youth Mental Health First Aid, strengthening our community mental health support capabilities.
- Public Health Educator attended two Child Passenger Safety Technician webinars for CEU credits and a GOLD Learning webinar for Lactation credits toward recertification. They also participated in the “Fourth Trimester: Postpartum Care in Rural New York” training and the Health of Birthing People webinar to deepen expertise in maternal health.

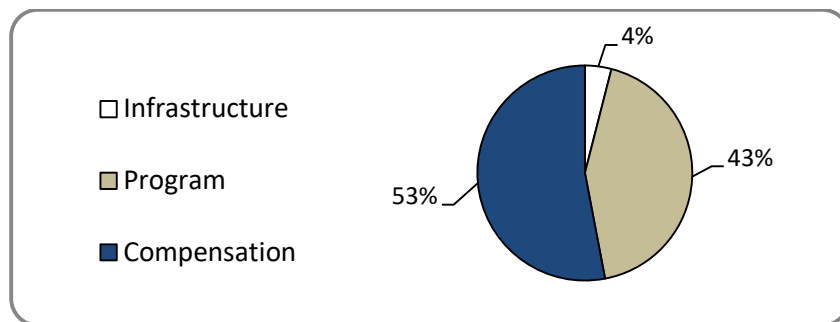

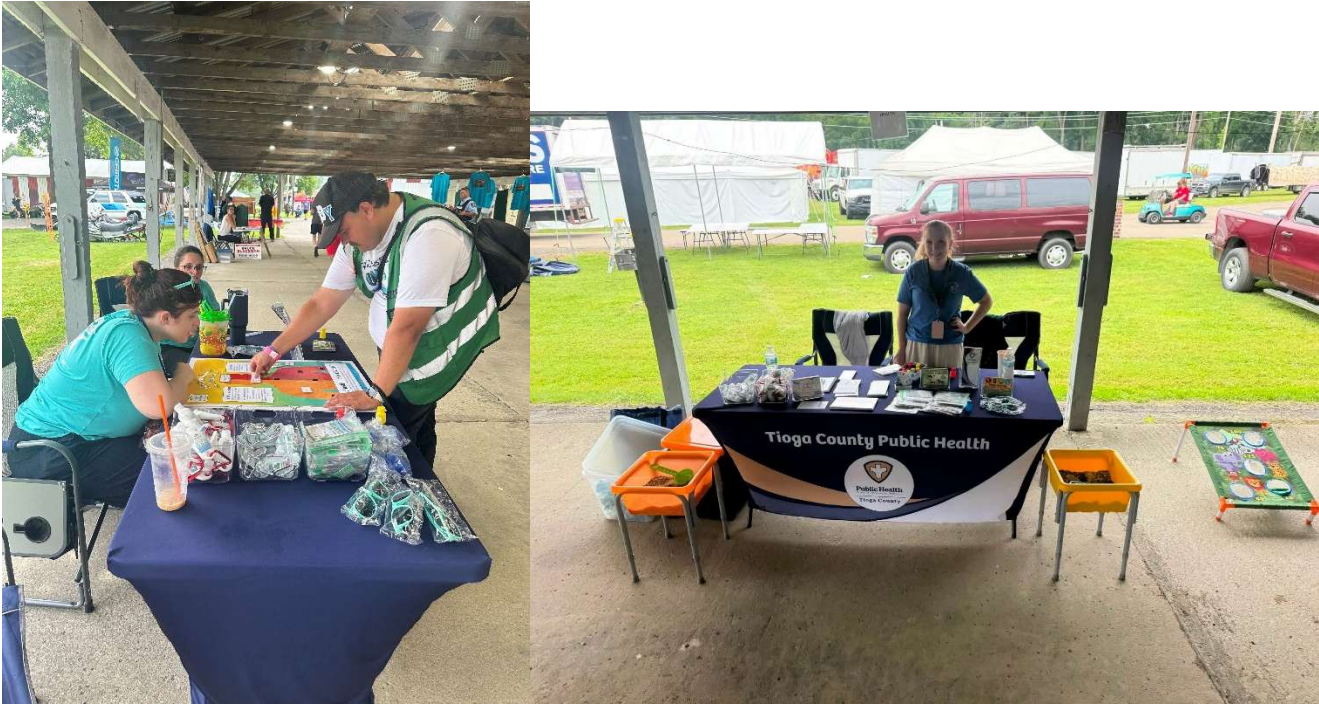

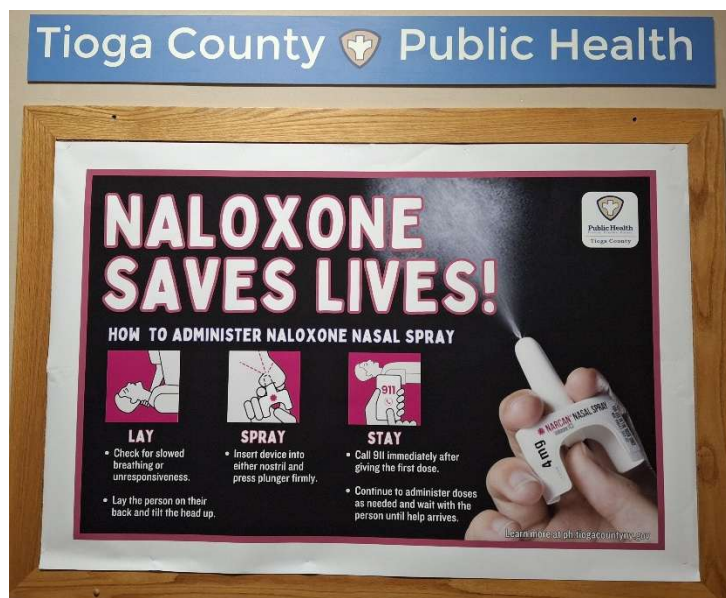
